

A HISTORIC OPPORTUNITY

The New Mexico Public Education Department invested in summer learning and established a joint initiative with tribal and county governments, plus key nonprofit partners, to engage at-risk youth and high school students.

American Rescue Plan (ARP) funds from the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) fund were allocated for two years to support paid Summer Enrichment Internships for students and at-risk youth statewide.
